From the Clerk's Corner......

The Rowan City Council met on Monday, September 5, 2022. Mayor Groom called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with five council members present and three visitors. The minutes of the August council meeting were read and approved.

Kevin and Betty Hadley asked for permission to put up the Belmond School Sign that's been in the city's possession for several years. Darlene Heaberlin has given permission for the sign to be erected on their property down by the highway. They would obtain the proper DOT permission. They also were asking permission to move the scholarship pop can recycle bin up near the old barbershop since the coop is now privately owned property and snow removal does not exist for that area. The council approved both requests.

The council also approved the appointments of Mariah Smith and McKenna Pentico to the Library board. Mariah went on the board to fill Berne Ketchum's term and will serve 6 years and McKenna will fill a 6 year term vacated by Jesse Winter.

The Mayor has spoken with Brian Miller from Hampton and he is willing to represent the City of Rowan. Eric Simonson has expressed concerns that two of the items he is currently working on for the city will have conflicts with his position as County Attorney, he would have to find alternate representation for those. He gave his blessing for the City to go with Miller and would assist in any way he can and forward whatever files to his office. Miller has been invited to attend the planning session on September 19th and the council wil make an official decision at that time.

The Clerk presented the first ound of question to the council from Simmering-Cory regarding the Ordinance Recodification that is due in 2023. The council will go through these line by line at the September 19th planning session.

A grant for \$1000 has been received from Alliant Energy to be used for new playground equipment. Additional monies will be requested from other sources.

Hollman announced to the group that the Sheriff would be willing to meet with the council if it was during work hours. Hollamn will get in touch with them regarding the meeting.

The council approved building permits for 127 Main Street for windows for the house and a chicken coop.

We've talked a lot in these columns about the whats and the whys of reading and stories. What we haven't spoken of, though, is the *where* of it all. So where's your favorite place to sit and read? RECIPE OF THE MONTH

SPOOKY S-MORES BARS

1 C. AP Flour
1/3 C. Rolled Oats
1 C. Graham Cracker Crumbs
1 t. Bakig powder
1/4 T. Kosher Salt
1/2 C. butter, melted

3/4 C. Packed Brown Sugar 1 Egg 4 Milk Chocolate Bars (large) 12 Ghost-shaped Marshmallows (Peeps) Optional: Black Food Coloring

- 1. Preheat Oven to 350 degrees. Butter an 8x8 inch pan. Line with parchment paper letting ends overlap. Butter parchment.
- 2. In a medium bowl, stir together flour oats, graham cracker crumbs, baking powder and salt.
- 3. In a bowl of an electric mixer, beat butter and sugar together. Add in egg and mix well. Stir in flour mixture until combined.
- 4. Spread into prepared pan, smooth top evenly and bake until done, about 18-20 minutes. Let cool on a wire rack.
- Once cooled cover top with candy bars, breaking up fourth bar to cover cookie base completely. Top with 12 ghostshaped marshmallows. (Place ghosts face down, as faces will melt under broiler)
- 6. Move top oven rack to the next to highest position (closer to the flame can cause parchment to burn). Place bars in oven for 1-2 minute until chocolate begins to melt and marshmallows are golden. Let cool, then use food coloring pen to add eyes and mouths to ghosts. Lift out of pan using the parchment overhang. Cut into bars. Serve warm or at room temperature.
