Did you know????? One in eight lowans is food insecure, meaning they do not have access to sufficient food to make up a healthy diet.

The Wright County Extension Service and the Master Gardeners in our area are working together to help remedy this problem. The Extension Service opened a food pantry here in Rowan over a year ago and it has been well received and is visited quite frequently. This Spring, Missy Loux from the Extension Service wrote a grant to purchase materials to build a community garden here in Rowan. She and Rhonda Benton have played an integral role in building, planting and maintaining the garden area. Rhonda is fulfilling her 40 hours of community service to earn her Master Gardener status.

The garden is located west of the Rowan Community Center in the lot vacated by the former barber shop. Mark Bruns was kind enough to build them a water tank so the gardens can be easily watered on a regular schedule. There is a variety of vegetables and herbs planted in the buckets and raised beds along with some pollinator plants for the bees and butterflies.

The produce raised in the gardens will be taken to the food pantry for distribution to those who need the food. Cont. on page 6



Memories of Rowan From Times Past

HILLTOP CAFÉ Rowan, IA

The Hilltop Café was located two miles west of Rowan, Iowa along Highway 3 It was owned by Rubin and Helen Mickelson for eighteen years from 1956 to 1974. In 1974 the highway was changed and the Hilltop was torn down. It was a restaurant before the Michelson's purchased it. They slept upstairs and lived in the downstairs making for a homey atmosphere for the customers with good home cooking added. It was also a Sinclair Station where gas and oil was sold.

In the earlier years they were open seven days a week from 7;00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. but were only open six days a week in later years. Breakfasts, lunches and dinners were served with Helen doing her own cooking. The doctors from the Clarion Clinic used to drive to the Hilltop for noon Lunch about once a week. They drove in several different cars in case of an accident.

The Mickelson's sold the property when the Highway 3 was to be changed and two homes were eventually constructed at that location.

From the Clerk's Corner.....

City Council met on June 5th at 7:00 p.m. with five council members, the mayor and city clerk present. There was also two members of the public present for the meeting.

There was considerable public input including everything from complaints about roosters in town, lawns not being mowed, a basement flooding when the septic tank was pumped and the new summer hours at the library. Action will be taken to try to remedy these complaints.

Mark Bruns requested that the city council approve the following people to the Board of Trustees for the fire department: Dale Hollman, Dale Arends, Les Andrews, Al Bailey and Mark Pluff. Motion was made by Park to approve all 5 nominees, 2nd by Hurtado and motion carried.

Virgil Park gave a maintenance report and also updated the council on the generator project. Park will be the project manager for the generator installation and will work with the Property and Maintenance Committee from the church and Randy DeBoer until the project is completed.

The Mayor closed the regular meeting and opened the public hearing for the 2nd reading of Ordinance 2023-04 Dust Control Fee and Ordinance 2023-05 Vacate Ballou Street for public input. No public input was offered. The Mayor closed the public hearing and reopened the regular session.

Motion made by Bruns to approve Ordinance 2023-04, 2nd by Hurtado. The motion was unanimous by roll call vote. Motion by Hollman to approve Ordinance 2023-05, 2nd by Park. Motion was approved unanimously by roll call vote.

The city council approved a new mosquito control contract and would like to be notified in advance when they are coming to spray. Hollman is going to get an estimate on the cost of piping the water that drains to the intake in the alley behing the community center from Main Street to the nearby intake.

The library requested to have Main Street shut down on Saturday, July 29th for an End of Summer Reading Bash and wanted a bounce house and food trucks on the street. The request was tabled until the city could receive copies of proof of liability insurance for both activities. The council also reviewed the library policy.

Groom recommended that installation of a water hydrant at the SW corner of Bingham and Main for use by the community garden be tabled for this year. The estimates were between \$1500 and \$2000. Bruns has placed a portable water container for the remainder of this year.

The mower and tractor owned by the city are almost ready for sale at public auction site. It was agreed to put a minimum bid of \$1500 on the tractor with a belly mower and \$500 on the JD mower.

The city received a grant for \$6000 to be put towards the new playground equipment. The city clerk will look into updated prices for equipment and also get prices for slightly smaller sets. Currently there is a 38 week for ordering.

Meeting was adjourned.

Have a BANG UP 4TH Just Keep it Quiet and Follow State of Iowa Code

The State Code breaks fireworks into two groups Consumer Fireworks and Novelty Fireworks. Consumer Fireworks are the ones sold at the fireworks stands and are arial display and bottle rockets, firecrackers, cherry bombs etc. and not legal in Rowan. A special permit issued by the city is required to use Consumer Fireworks within the city limits. Novelty Fireworks are described as party poppers, drop pops, snakes, and some sparklers. Novelty fireworks may not have more than 0.25 grams of explosive mixture must state on their packaging "not subject to D.O.T. Hazardous Materials Regulations." Novelty fireworks can be used in the city limits of Rowan but must not include bottle rockets or any aerial displays or firecrackers.

Violation of state code may result in significant fines if not obeyed.

JULY'S RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Snap Green Beans From the Wright County Extention Service

Boiled Green Beans:

Boil water in a pot. Add green beans in water, boil until green beans reach the texture you like. Usually 6 minutes.

Microwave Green Beans:

Put beams and 1/2 cup of water in a microwave safe dish with a lid. Microwave on high for 5 minutes and check doneness. Microwave for one minute at a time until the beans reach the texture you like.

Roasted Green Geans:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees Fahrenheit. Toss green beans in a bowl with 1 table-spoon oil. Spread green beans on a baking sheet and sprinkle with a small amount of salt and pepper. Roast for about 12-15 minutes, stirring them after 6 minutes until green beans are tender and browned.
